I have, for some time, been wanting to string up the dipole and press into service a FT 1000 MP that has been languishing in its box for a year at that location.

Well, to cut a long story short, the Chairman could not get his act together but had the bright idea, after a prompt from the Station Manager M3TBI Anne, to pay a visit to the Hornsea Amateur Radio Club HARC, which is located some 400 m away from the /A location.

We were really lucky because, on Wednesday evening, we had a storm that had somewhat subsided by 7ish. There had been plenty of thunder/lightning earlier, but all settled down when we arrived at the Club location. When I say we were lucky, we were greeted by old friends including Duncan Heathershaw G3TLI, and Anthony Pearce G0AZQ, who informed us we were seeing a mirage, as they should have been out on a foxhunt but, due the wet stuff, it had been cancelled.



I quickly made my request: "could I please borrow your shack for half an hour or so". "What do you want to do?" they asked. I informed them of our USB Net that takes place every Wednesday. "No problems" they said, and then there was a scurry of activity in locating and setting up an HF radio, in this case a nice TS 850S with built in ATU; another stroke of luck as the Station ATU was not back from a field contest event.



Committee notices

Report & Proposal by VMARS to the RSGB Radio Spectrum Forum 5th November 2011

VMARS has two primary spectrum aims:-AM recognition and 5MHz expansion.

AM Recognition

VMARS continues to seek full recognition of the use of AM on the HF bands. To quote Don Beattie, RSGB Acting General Manager, writing in the October RSGB Newsletter.

"Amateur radio is often described as a broad church. From those who enjoy microwave experimentation to those who rag-chew; from those who compete in contests to those who exploit digital modes; from those who work with amateur television to those whose joy is QRP; they all have equal rights to the amateur spectrum, and we must welcome them to our ranks."

AM is part of that 'broad church' and it is the aim of VMARS to promote AM from being a footnote to a fully accepted voice mode in those bands where voice communication is allowed. AM is no longer solely the province of vintage radio or military radio enthusiasts. Amateur stations, including Society Members, using modern and experimental technology such as pulse width modulation can now be heard on 80m producing high quality transmissions. Our Members continue to report abuse and deliberate jamming from uninformed amateur stations, particularly from mainland Europe, where AM is less popular than it is in the UK. Reminding delegates at IARU regional level conferences that AM is a valued and increasingly popular transmission mode is, in our view, essential if we are to continue to enjoy those equal rights expounded by Don Beattie.

Current band plans are confusing. The IARU Region 1 Band Plan refers to HF maximum bandwidths of "2.7kHz all modes". Although AM is an allowable mode, no references to it are included. AM operates with bandwidths of around 6 kHz. For the uninformed, using AM appears to contravene the Band Plan and results in some operators behaving badly toward AM stations. We urge the RSGB to make it abundantly clear at both UK and international levels that AM is a fully permitted mode, even though the Band Plan appears to completely contradict this.

AM Recognition - Proposed amendment to RSGB Band Plan

In support of our Members aims for a wider acceptance of the use of AM, VMARS propose that a note to the effect that AM may be used, subject to the usual operating courtesies, in the 2.7 kHz segment allocated for voice modes and added to the guidance notes provided for each band where voice modes are allowed. We would also very much like to see this change at IARU Region 1 level. This change can be made at no cost and will serve to avoid present confusion.

5MHz Expansion

VMARS fully supports the RSGB negotiations with OFCOM for agreement to extend the existing spot frequency allocations in the 60m band to a fixed allocation of bandwidth for general Amateur use. We would like to add a proposal that 60 m 'notching' of PLT devices is included in any discussions. Our understanding is that this is not a

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current requirement of manufacturers, although 'notching' is undertaken on all other amateur bands below 30MHz .

Our Members would like to be assured that any negotiations between the RSGB, OFCOM and the MoD will include the provision of AM as an allowable transmission mode in any revised 60 m allocations. Also, we would appreciate an update of how discussions between all UK parties on this subject are progressing and whether there are any discussions scheduled to take place at international level.

Amateur band extensions

The Society has received an e-mail from VMARS Member Peter Chadwick, in which he has advised of possible avenues for the extension of existing amateur bands. These include ideas for extensions to 30, 17 and 12 m bands, which we understand have been communicated to the Spectrum Manager. Of particular interest to many VMARS Members are his suggestions for the extension of 80 m from 3.8 to 3.9MHz, which the Society would wish to be included in any future discussions between the RSGB and OFCOM.

Peter has extensive knowledge and experience of the inner workings of international spectrum agreements and the regulatory frameworks which have been gained both in a professional capacity at CEPT and as a representative of IARU at ITU meetings. His ideas for the expansion of amateur radio spectrum use are acknowledged and wholly supported by VMARS.

PLT (See also 5MHz expansion - above)

Our Members are reporting increasing problems with local radio interference from a wide range of devices polluting the HF spectrum. In some locations, the interference is so bad that operation on HF bands has had to be abandoned. Society Members are encouraged to contact OFCOM in such circumstances but many are reluctant to do so for fear of upsetting neighbours. Those who have requested OFCOM intervention have generally reported positive results, although there have been one or two instances where the source of interference has been identified but OFCOM have declined to take any action. One Member was advised that his 1950's vintage receiver was 'too sensitive'. However, a positive outcome was eventually achieved.

The RSGB has VMARS total support in maintaining efforts to ensure that legal obligations of OFCOM to minimise spectrum pollution are fully adhered to and manufacturers are held fully responsible for ensuring that their products emissions are within maximum permitted levels.

Venue for VMARS AGM 2012 and beyond

The Committee is keen for the AGM to be both an effective business meeting and offer the opportunity for a social occasion with added interest provided by the venue. It had been decided that the 2012 AGM will again take place at Bletchley Park, to coincide with a major event at the venue, and such a possibility has already been mooted with the organisers. Once the Bletchley Park diary is settled, we can then announce the date of the 2012 AGM.

Looking ahead to 2013 and beyond, we would like to give Members the opportunity to suggest interesting venues for us to consider. A possibility we may explore is to hold the AGM at Baginton to combine with a visit to the Airfield, but other venues such as The Yorkshire Air Museum (Elvington), Hack Green, Cosford, Bovington, Blandford, Neatishead (Radar Museum) and Thorpe Camp, are

examples of places of interest where we could combine the AGM with an interesting day out. In order to canvass Members' opinions, we would very much appreciate if you could return the tear-off slip on page 9 of this News Sheet to the VMARS Chairman by 1st December 2011, with your suggestions.

Publications matters

Committee receives comments from Members regarding what should and should not appear in the Letters pages of this News Sheet and on the Reflector. As a Committee, we have reviewed our policy as follows:

In general, two types of correspondence are received as 'Letters to the Editor'. General interest contributions, whether technical or otherwise of relevance to the hobby, or personal news, are welcome as such and will generally be published, sometimes in edited form. The other type of offering is what can best be described as the 'open letter' to the Committee. This type of correspondence should rightfully be addressed to the Committee for its attention. and as with all such correspondence, it will be considered by the Committee. The correspondent will receive a Committee reply in due course. Such correspondence will not be published in the News Sheet. The Committee is mindful of the fact that it does not wish to suppress unfavourable comment about Society management out of hand but such comments should always be addressed to the Committee in the first instance.

The VMARS Reflector is intended primarily for the exchange of technical information and, indeed, some very interesting topics have been debated and explained via that medium. Only half of our Members are subscribers to the Reflector which is why we do not regard it as an 'official' method for communicating Society issues. On occasions, subscribers to the Reflector have posted remarks and canvassed opinions/actions on Society matters. In general, there is only a handful of Members who have engaged in such debates and, with the limited involvement of the Society as a whole, cannot be considered to be representative of Society opinion. For this reason, and for the avoidance of doubt, such posts will no longer be allowed on the Reflector, the use of which should be restricted to technical content.

VMARS and RSGB

VMARS is affiliated to RSGB, although not all VMARS Members are Members of RSGB. We recognise the importance of RSGB as the National body to represent the

interests of UK radio amateurs, and so support the need for RSGB to take immediate radical action in order to secure financial stability, and to establish a management structure which will ensure that RSGB can function thereafter. RSGB Members have an opportunity to vote on published proposals and attend an EGM specially convened to address RSGB's immediate needs. We urge VMARS Members to use their vote in the manner they believe to be appropriate to securing the future of the RSGB.
